Recap of February 18th, Luncheon Speaker

Mike Barrington, former Big Sir of Branch 116 in Walnut Creek, gave us a PowerPoint presentation about the French Resistance during the German Occupation of France during World War 2. Mike wrote an historical novel about just that, and his presentation included photos of the locations where the novel takes place: the railroad yards where supply trains from Germany were sabotaged; railroad viaducts that were blown up; the town hall used as headquarters of the local Gestapo; the monastery where the monks assisted in the Resistance; and so forth.

Mike lived in France, belonged to a French order of missionary priests, married a Frenchwoman and his father-in-law was a member of the Resistance. His "local knowledge" was very apparent during his fascinating talk!

CONFUSED ABOUT HOW TO USE *SIR*?

Many members are, and here are some tips.

SIR stands for ***Sons In Retirement...*** if you want to use the corporate title, use ***SIR, INC.*** or ***Sons In Retirement, Inc.***

MOST COMMON MISTAKES:

SIR is never plural—there is only one Sons In Retirement—**so, never write or say *SIRS*** when referring to Sons In Retirement.

SIR is always capitalized.

There are no periods between the letters.

The possessive of *SIR* is *SIR's*.

SOME EXAMPLES:

John is a member of *SIR*—Not *SIRS*.

SIR's annual meeting is held in August—possessive

Sir refers to an individual member of *SIR*.

SOME MORE EXAMPLES:

Sir John Jones is a member of *SIR*—Singular.

Many *Sirs* attended the *SIR* luncheon—Plural.

A *Sir's* son attended a *SIR* luncheon—Singular Possessive.

Jim Gurke, Badge #56

Live, learn, train and connect...these are the four pillars for success for Jim Gurke and an organization he would later help build. The offspring of first-generation immigrants from Poland, Jim is a product of Detroit and a father returning home after WWII. He enjoyed his upbringing with his sister in a loving, middle class family in southeast Michigan. With a love of reading that he got from his parents early in life, Jim discovered the world through books. He became the first to graduate from college in his family, and for a while, tried teaching American studies and history to eighth graders high on adolescent hormones and low on interest.



One day in 1980, Jim had the epiphany to head out of Michigan and go north to one of the wildest places in North America. Like Johnny Horton's song, North to Alaska, Jim headed "way up north... where the river is windin' and big nuggets they are findin'." Jim didn't find those nuggets of gold, but did find a place full of beauty, adventure and friendly people. "I moved to Alaska and never looked back." As Jim learned, Alaska has reasons to be the setting for books about its wilderness, sled dogs and tough men. Jack London wrote blockbuster books about Alaska (*White Fang* and *Call of the Wild*) as did John Muir (*Travels in Alaska*). Jon Krakauer's book, *Into the Wild*, (recently made into a movie) tells the tale of what people bring to Alaska—disaffection, idealism, the search for reinvention and redemption. Jim took advantage of the open roads and magnificent vistas to do some serious long-distance bicycling, being careful to stay clear of the grizzlies along the way.

Jim enjoyed working at the Alaska Housing Finance Corporation which provides money to the Alaska General Fund by underwriting mortgages for homebuyers to obtain safe, affordable, energy efficient housing. AHFC is also well-respected for helping renters avoid evictions and securing housing for seniors, persons with disabilities and other special needs populations.

Together with former Senator Ted Stevens' staff, Jim helped secure land and funding for the Alaska Job Corps Center. Job Corps is a tuition-free training and education program that connects eligible young men and women with the skills and educational opportunities they need to establish practical careers. The Corps use a four-step program to learn about and prepare for careers, search and apply for jobs, and then get hired. Live, learn, train, and connect are considered pillars of success for Job Corps trainees. For his efforts, Jim was awarded Alaska state employee of year!

Jim has developed friendships with many people over the years, and friendship is something he takes very seriously. He credits his friends for a lot of successes in his life and maintains connections with his buddies in Alaska, Santa Cruz (where he vacationed to get away from those dark cold winters), and Santa Rosa (where he met guys who played golf and eventually got him involved in SIR17 about seven years ago.) Jim has served as our Little and Big Sir, Secretary, and is currently our Assistant Secretary. As you likely know, Jim loves golf and co-chairs the golf club with Roy Thuestad. He says that along with golf, the luncheons and guest speakers attracted him to our Branch. Jim encourages us to meet more SIR17 members and to sit at different tables at luncheons...with hopes that in-person luncheons become possible again soon! Jim, thank you for the golden nuggets of friendship and dedication to SIR17!

SIR BRANCH Golf PROCLAMATION CLARIFICATION

There has been discussion in some Branch BEC's and Golf Committees about opening Golf with a resolution and protocol that deviates from the Model Resolution and Protocol the State Board has approved for use by Branches. Some of the proposed changes are significant and greatly reduce the safety afforded to members participating in Branch golf. The proposed changes also open the Branches to a much greater risk of liability for failure to provide due care for Branch members participating in golf activities.

The Model Golf Resolution and Protocol the State approved was created in consultation with our Insurance Provider and our State Legal Advisor to provide a Minimum of care and due diligence for the Branches.

If the Branch leadership diminishes these standards, they are doing so at the risk of liability to themselves, their members and the Branch itself. Each Branch is a Separate Corporation and is responsible for its own governance and responsibilities.

I understand that Branches would like to set their own rules, and they want their Area Governor or Regional Director to approve those rules. However, the AG's and RD's are not authorized to approve modifications to the Model Resolution and Protocol; it isn't their job to modify standards set by the State Board.

Branches must understand that the Model Resolution and Protocol are there to protect SIR Branches against claims of Gross Negligence, and the Branches need to understand the Model Resolution and Protocol are there to Protect them; not restrict their reopening golf. The same may be said for the reopening of other Outdoor Activities.
