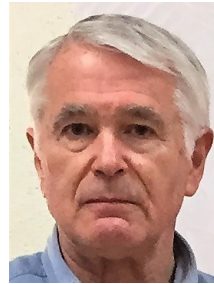

## SIR Branch 17, Member Profiles:

**Steven Saulsbury, Badge #144**

As a kid, how did you earn spending money? Did you join the 4H, grow sweet corn and sell it to local markets? Steven Saulsbury did, and he earned enough cash to buy himself a Honda 55 motorcycle. Not only is Steve hard-working and resourceful, but he is also probably one of the smartest guys in our club. Yet, he is very humble, friendly, and fun to chat with.

Steve grew up in Solvang, CA, known for its Danish-style architecture, wineries, and vintage motorcycle museum. His dad was a farmer and then a plumber, and his mom worked in the banking and insurance businesses. Steve walked to school where he played varsity basketball and football. He enjoyed his classes in chemistry, math, and physics, but hated English and history. Right then, you could see he was headed towards a career in technology. He went to college and studied physics which became more interesting when calculus “talked to him” and made abstract concepts come alive.

Steve has had many different jobs in the tech industry, including building radar systems for F15 and F18 fighter jets. He came to Santa Rosa to work at Optical Coating Laboratory, Inc. (OCLI), which was one of the first high tech companies in our area. OCLI (later as JDSU and now Viavi) made coatings for spacecraft windows; special mirrors for the Polaroid SX-70 instant camera; color-shifting pigments used on the currency of more than 100 nations to thwart counterfeiting; and a 1-millimeter-wide optical filter that allowed communication companies to vastly increase the amount of data that could be sent over a single fiber optic line. Steve worked on “transparent conductive materials.” He likes to take concepts and make them real, bringing products out of research and putting them into production. After helping move his products over to another company, Steve retired from JDSU in 2014 when they were downsizing. Although he still helps occasionally, he says it was hard if not impossible “to dump 33 years of experience into someone else’s head.”

Steve and his wife love to travel, but do not like to fly. Instead, they take LONG train rides and cruises. They do not need to get any place fast and enjoy the slower pace of just getting there. He warns us though “those cruises are like petri dishes,” a great place for germs to grow and attack humans. They had big plans for cruises and train trips throughout Europe last year but, like so much else, that got postponed.

Steve joined SIR Branch 17 three years ago and was sponsored by Gordon Boultee, a long-time work colleague. Steve joined SIR17 to have guys to play golf with, even though he admits golf is probably the worst thing you can do to your back. ### REVIEW OF GOLF PROCEDURES AS WE KICK OFF BRANCH 17/76 COMPETITIONS



1. **Upon checking in at the pro shop, look to the table opposite the bulletin board.** There you will find two important items: a roster of all Branch 17/76 golf members; and an alphabetical listing of those members with your respective index and course handicap. For the weeks of August 2, 9 and 17 the buy-in for the competition is on the house. Beginning August 23 your buy-in cost is \$5 payable to the BV staff at check in.

2. **If you wish to be included in the money competition**, please locate your name from the roster and place a check mark next to it. Your committee will then match those names against all the score cards. Score cards are signed and attested to, and inserted in the

SIR's box located immediately beyond the scoring table. Cards not found in the SIR's scoring box are considered void.

3. Regarding hole #8 closest to the pin. As a reminder, play from the red tee only under one of three conditions. First, your score card indicates that you play from the red tees. Second, your score card indicates that you play from the white/red combo tees. Third, that your "course handicap" (not your handicap index) is 23 or higher. An alphabetical list of all 17/76 SIR's golfers is found at the scorer's table with a highlighted column of respective "course handicaps."

4. Some important reminders. First, all players must tee off within the starting times set aside by the BV staff for our 17/76 competitions. This is important for the person keeping score to promptly retrieve score cards. All score cards must be signed and attested.

Please legibly write the names of those in your group.

Lastly, if the player uses a tee box other than the white tees, please indicate on the score card the tee box that player uses; i.e. the red with an initial "R", the red/white combo with an initial "C". This is critical because course handicaps vary per tee box.

### Recap of speaker of July 15 Meeting

Semi-retired neurologist, medical researcher and West Sonoma County resident Allan Bernstein gave us a fascinating presentation titled *The Biology of Memory*, What could possibly go wrong? Memory has four elements: Input, Registration, Encoding and Retrieval. We receive Inputs through our senses: sight, sound, smell taste and touch. We only Register these inputs if we are paying attention, interested, alert and not impaired by drugs, alcohol, etc. Encoding or organizing inputs requires that we get adequate, quality sleep and that our brains have not been impaired by structural damage. Our ability to Retrieve memories slows with time, although often these memories are not lost, just delayed (for example when you remember someone's name two hours after you run into them at Starbucks). Music and smells are particularly well preserved over time.

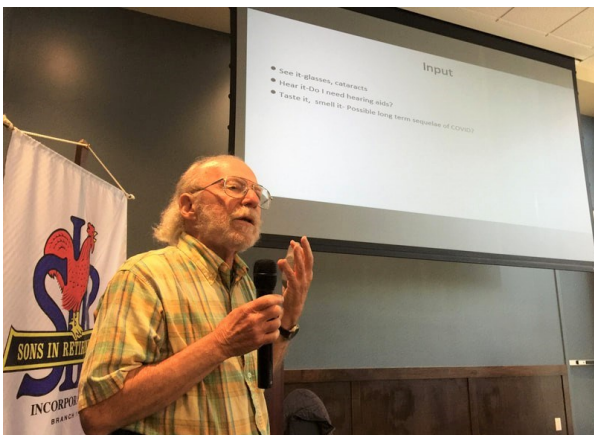
Reversible causes of memory loss include medications (even OTC ones), *(continued on top right)*

depression, sleep apnea, alcohol, vitamin B12 deficiency and low thyroid.

Structural or permanent memory loss can be caused by head trauma, particularly concussions and repeated blows to the head, such as experienced by successful boxers and football players; strokes; brain infections; and toxic chemicals such as herbicides and pesticides.

Dementia is gradual, progressive and involves multiple areas of the brain, such as memory, judgment, mood, speech and language and mathematics. Alzheimer's disease is the most common dementia and is defined by specific changes in the brain. Risk factors include a specific gene, a family member with AD, head injuries, smoking for many years, sleep disturbances, oral disease, and strokes and heart attacks. Protective factors include high education, keeping cognitively active, physical activity, a low-carb diet, mild alcohol intake (one glass of wine per day), and blood pressure management.
