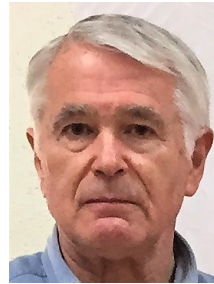

understanding them, I believe that responsibility is hidden within them. Certainly, the right of maintaining life carries a double meaning. We, as individuals, hold our lives as special and unique but we also have a sacred duty to respect the existence of our fellow humans. This fact raises the question of "choice." Wearing a mask or not, getting a vaccination or not, getting a booster shot or not, etc. etc. are the critical choices that are presented to society daily. On the surface, the attainment of "happiness" as society strives for this "right" presents, for me, a more complex understanding and interpretation that this concept reveals. In my mind, happiness means liberty. Liberty means freedom. Freedom means choice. Choice means "the heck with you, I'm doing it my way!" I find this interpretation to be very challenging. Therein lies a conflict. The eternal chase for "the pursuit of happiness" is fundamental to humans. I believe that this feeling is shared by those who believe in vaccinations, mask wearing, and those who resist these practices.

Because I always attempt to add a little bit of comedy to my monthly messages, I would like to share a little story that my brother-in-law recently told me. Louie has an automotive repair shop in the East Bay. One day an unmasked customer comes in and begins to talk to him about his car problem. Almost immediately Louie speaks to the gentleman of the requirement for a face cover in his shop. The customer responds saying he does not believe in masks or getting vaccinated. He continues to speak his reasoning concerning vaccines saying that "Big Brother" can track you with those injections. My brother-in-law quickly responds stating that he got his shots for that same reason...if he gets lost, his wife will know where he is. My wife, Sandra, just located me...she'll be coming pretty soon!

And State SIR Inc. says self-administered tests are OK with respect to the alternate "negative test result within three days of the event" option.

Dr. Jeffrey Ebersole is on the faculty of the School of Dental Medicine, UNLV, as a professor of Biomedical Sciences and associate dean for research, and teaches microbiology and immunology to predoctoral students.

Recap of Speaker for August 19, 2021

SRFD Assistant Fire Marshal Paul Lowenthal gave an informative presentation on preparing for emergencies, whether fire, flood, earthquake or other.

If you Google "Ready Santa Rosa" you will find the City's website (<https://srcity.org/3254/Ready-Santa-Rosa>) for Emergency & Preparedness Information. Paul stressed the importance of understanding the different alert systems, which ones you need to register for to receive their alerts, and why you might not receive an alert when your friends do. The alerts are: Emergency Alert System (EAS); Wireless Emergency Alerts (WEA); SoCoAlert; Nixle; TV and radio stations; Hi/Lo Sirens; and NOAA radios. A complete description of each is on the website. You must register to receive alerts from SoCoAlert and Nixle.

Next Paul stressed the importance of knowing your evacuation zone. The City's are named and have not changed. The County's are alphanumeric and have been updated.

The next part of Paul's presentation was about what the City is doing and what you can do to reduce wildfire risks. Google "Wildfire Ready Santa Rosa" or go directly to the website <https://srcity.org/3558/Wildfire-Ready> for the details.

That was just the first few minutes! Mark has an amazing repertoire of stories to tell and they're all fascinating. He talks fast, which of course is a good thing for a radio announcer/disc jockey. He drives fast and enjoys moving his Miata around corners at speeds that have serious effects on a person's intestines. He collects lots of records (the music kind) and at one time had over 15,000 units. Even today he still has over 6000 units that include 45s, LPs, 78s, CDs, cassettes, and music videos. He proudly displays a fully functional juke box in his living room.

Mark's history began in Chicago where he collected customizable model cars and coins, including Indian head pennies, buffalo nickels, mercury dimes, and silver dollars. After surviving 16 winters, his dad mercifully moved Mark and the family to the warmth of Los Angeles. But two things Mark does not like are hot weather and overcrowded cities full of traffic that slow him down. Did I mention he likes to drive fast? Sonoma County offered him (and grapes) the right kind of weather, as well as a good college, a beautiful woman and plenty of open roads. He says, "I plan to stay here until I'm gone!"



At Sonoma State College (as it was called then) in 1973 he joined a group of friendly, music-loving, record-collecting students who started the college's radio station, KSUN. As a young disc jockey, he was given the misnomer "Mark Oldies," which now as a Sir seems to be much more appropriate. Mark's smooth voice can still be heard on KRCB radio, 104.9, under the moniker "Mark Nicholas." He also has a mobile DJ biz where he's "been spinnin' stax o' wax for nigh onto half a century now" and specializes in tunes from the 50s to the 70s. Mark's interest in amplified sound has served us well for many years as our man in charge of audio at SIR17 luncheons and picnics.
