For me, November is the month that emphasizes something that is unfortunately taken for granted.

The big holiday of the month is Thanksgiving. The name in itself presents the theme for the month.

The history of this celebration goes back to the year 1621. The Plymouth colonists, arriving in the previous year, and the Wampanoag Native Americans shared an autumn harvest feast that is considered today to be the first Thanksgiving gathering in the New World. Since that time, individual colonies and states celebrated this festive holiday; however, there was no energy to establish a unifying day of thanks on a large scale. Researching this holiday even further, I discovered that in 1637 Massachusetts Colony Governor John Winthrop established a “thanksgiving” to celebrate the “safe return of a band of heavily armed hunters.” *(continued on page 2)*

President Abraham Lincoln established the "Day of Thanks" in the midst of the Civil War by a proclamation in 1863. Lincoln urged Americans to set aside the last Thursday of November as a day of Thanksgiving. However, at that time, he was unable to influence the States in rebellion and as a result the festive day was incomplete. Continuing to 1941, an Act of Congress established Thanksgiving Day as a "legal annual national" holiday. Today, we celebrate Thanksgiving with TV football games and of course, family gatherings.

In my opinion, the second important event in November's calendar is Veterans Day. This day was originally designated as Armistice Day by President Woodrow Wilson at the end of World War I in 1919. At the time, only thirty states made it a state holiday. On June 1, 1954, the name of the event was renamed to Veterans Day. As opposed to Memorial Day, which is observed in May, Veterans Day celebrates the living service members whereas the former recognizes the memory of the veterans who have served in past wars and conflicts.

Recognizing these two important November holidays is important in that each complements one another with a common thread. Their similarity lies in the fact that both have the spirit of thankfulness. On that special Thursday we, as a nation, reflect on the bounty, freedom and the liberty that are gifted to Americans. On Veterans Day we extend that sense of "thank you" to the many men and women who have served in the armed forces. These two November events give us moments to reflect on the true meaning of two words...a simple "**thank you.**"

was the happy faces on the attendees and the sense we are on the cusp of getting our Branch fully back on track. And I certainly appreciated the efforts of our volunteers who confirmed tax and waiver status, collected the lunch money, ran the raffle, helped set everything up and take things down, and coordinated with the Epicenter management and kitchen staff.

The path through the buffet line starts from our luncheon room back out to the lobby where you first came in, snakes around the bowling alley shoe desk to the private bowling lanes where the food line is, and then back into our luncheon room. Going forward we will tweak the food table so that the salad will be first, the dressings and/or gravy will be labeled, and the cookies will be at the end of the line, not off to one side. Epicenter has been extremely responsive to every request and suggestion we have made. We are fortunate to have such a great venue and easy to work with personnel.

Last, I am very optimistic about our Branch going into 2022. Before the end of this year, COVID booster shots should be available to most, if not all, of our members. Our grandkids in the 5-11 years age group will be able to be fully vaccinated by the end of this year or early next year. Merck has applied to the FDA for emergency use authorization of a pill to treat infections, which might be approved in a matter of weeks. Approximately 80 percent of county residents 12+ years of age are fully vaccinated and the number has been increasing about one percent per week. If the trend continues, 90 percent of our eligible residents could be vaccinated by Christmas! Here's hoping! Taken together, this all means that in 2022 our members should be able to resume our many activities with fewer concerns about the possibility of a breakthrough infection and/or its consequences. And our RAMP committee is about to kick off activities to help us all recruit new members!

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Recap of Speaker for October 21, 2021

Susan Farren is a retired paramedic, supervisor, operations manager, counselor and EMS educator. She related her own tumultuous life experiences to illustrate the physical and mental toll that the stress of being a first responder can take. First responders have higher rates of alcoholism, drug use, suicide, divorce (a 70% rate), and a greater chance of dying by stroke, heart attack and cancer than the general population.

Her research led her to found First Responders Resiliency, Inc. of which she is the Executive Director. FRRRI provides *preventative* education and training to first responders and the military so that they can do their stressful jobs and be *resilient*. Their motto is "Putting PTSD Out of Business." They are developing a Resiliency Center on an 18 acre parcel of land in Cotati. Their website is:

Marvin Mai, Badge #086

You've got to meet Marvin Mai! He's a gentle man with an iconic smile. He served in the Air Force. He reads both fiction and nonfiction books. He plays the trumpet. He has worked all his life, including stints in the newspaper industry (delivering papers,) restaurant business (washing dishes at a five-and-dime soda fountain) and farming (herding cows and cleaning chicken coops.) He travels extensively and has been to 45 countries. He's even been to North Korea! (He can tell you more about that amazing trip.)

Marvin grew up in Kansas as an only child with his mom and grandparents during the early years of WWII while his dad was away fighting the war. They lived on a rented farm and raised wheat, cows, and chickens. He spent the first six years of grade school attending four different schools.



He paints an image of these as quaint one-room country schools with no running water, no electricity, a potbelly stove that kept them warm during brutal Kansas winters, and an outdoor toilet that he jokingly says was "for both girls and boys!" He was the only first grader in the room...yes, it was a small school.

When his dad returned and began working for Safeway stores, they moved often before settling in the town of Russell. (Russell, located about in the middle of KS, boasts that it is the home of former Senators Bob Dole and Arlen Specter.) Russell high school was remarkable for its marching band led by Mr. Bailey, who enlisted Marvin as well as nearly one quarter of the 400 total student body. Marvin didn't play sports but did get a lot of exercise marching at football games and pep rallies. His love of music guided him to Bethany College, a top ranked music school about 90 miles from Russell. Although occasional gigs playing trumpet with the Ted Smith Dance Band did pay well, a career in music did not seem professionally possible, so he switched to majoring in business (economics) in his junior year.

Nearing graduation from college and losing his deferment, he was warned by the head of the local draft board that

he was going to be drafted into the Army. Preferring the Air Force, Marvin quickly headed to their recruiting office! Although unable to become a pilot or navigator due to issues with his sight and hearing, he passed the exams and was assigned into the radar units as part of the joint Canadian-USA North American Aerospace Defense Command (NORAD). As in his younger days growing up, Marvin moved many times to a variety of stations around the country and world. While stationed in Reno NV, he met the attractive female organizer of a service club when competing in a chess match. He says, "I came in second in the match but won the girl," and he and Pat have been married for 56 years!

After 22 years in the Air Force, Marvin retired as a major and moved to Santa Rosa (Pat's hometown) in 1984. He went back to college at Sonoma State and earned a master's degree in Organizational Development and took additional business classes. For the next 19 years, he taught bookkeeping at what was to become Empire College.

Finally ready to retire, but wanting to stay socially active, Marvin joined SIR Branch 76 and later Branch 17 where he knew several of the members. "I wanted to get together with guys I knew and have some comradery." In both branches, he found men with similar interests in global affairs, reading and travel. He enjoyed SIR so much that he brought friends into the club, including George and Bill Traverso. Marvin taps his expertise in bookkeeping and international travel, serving as a key member of the SIR17 audit committee and the chair of the Global Forum club, which he kept going via Zoom during the past year. He also is a strong advocate for helping the hearing-impaired guys in our club fully enjoy all the activities. He looks forward to talking...and listening...to current and new members as we return to in-person meetings.

Opportunity to Participate in Alzheimer's Prevention Research Study

Our July guest speaker was Allan Bernstein, MD, a semi-retired neurologist and medical researcher. His talk was *The Biology of Memory, what could possibly go wrong?* He informed Little Sir Gordon Boulton that he has a research study on Alzheimer's prevention that will be starting in the near future, and he is looking for volunteer participants. The goal is to identify people who may be 'at risk' for cognitive decline based on a blood test showing a buildup of amyloid and tau, the two markers for Alzheimer's disease in the brain. The criteria to participate include the following:

- Age range 55-80
- Normal cognitive exam on a screening (can be done on a computer)
- Positive blood test as noted above
- Negative MRI for other risk factors, such as strokes. People who cannot get MRIs for any reason are excluded as it is done for screening and safety assessments during the study
- No other serious illnesses
- Has a study partner who can help assess any cognitive changes (spouse, friend, adult children, etc.)

The study will last about three years. All costs for all testing/exams/MRIs are covered by the study sponsor. There are no costs to the individual or their insurance company.

Exclusions:

- Dementia or cognitive impairment
- Abnormal liver function tests on initial screening

The study involves an IV infusion, once a month, for nine months. There is a placebo arm to the study. After the initial nine months, there is tracking for any cognitive decline or side effects for up to three years, using online visits about every six months, including the study partner's assessment of the individual.

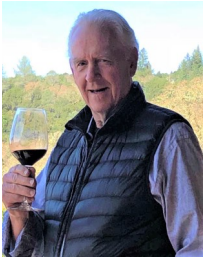

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GOLF:



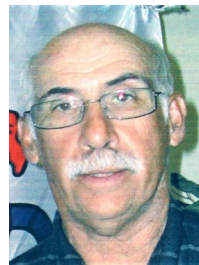

Mandatory Telephone 10-Digit Dialing

What is the new dialing procedure?

To complete all local or long distance calls, now you need to dial either the area code + telephone number or 1 + area code + telephone number. This applies to all calls within your area code that are currently dialed with only the 7-digits.

It was supposed to have become effective on October 24, 2021. So far, some calls I have made have went through with just the 7-digits while some others required the area code. All this extra dialing, just so we will be able to call the Suicide Prevention Lifeline using on a 3-digit number?
