traits: love for flying, family, country and ultimately respect and love for humanity.

Charlie Brown was the pilot of the B-17 that had completed a mission over Germany and was returning to his base in England. The American bomber had the letters "Ye Olde Pub" stenciled on its nose. Franz Stigler was the German pilot in a Messerschmitt fighter that encountered the American plane over the North Sea. The large B-17 was nicknamed "Four Motors" by the German aviators. As the American bomber was returning to its English supply base, Franz Stigler noticed massive damage on the "Pub." Large shrapnel holes throughout the fuselage and missing parts on the tail elevators and rudder proved that the aircraft was a "miracle in flight." Franz was amazed that the airplane was still flying as pilot Brown was having difficulty in maintaining power with the weakened engines. In addition, some of the Americans on board were either dead or gravely wounded by the recent combat ordeal. As pilot Stigler flew next to the huge airplane, he waved to the American and realizing the condition of the severely damaged craft consciously decided not to attack.

A question remained in the mind of Charlie Brown for many years: "who was he and why did he let us go?" Certainly, the B-17 was returning from a bombing run from Stigler's homeland. Obviously, the giant "Four Motors" inflicted untold destruction to military sites and mortal ruin to German civilians. A partial answer to Brown's thought might reside in pilot Stigler's compassionate personality. Franz Stigler never became a member of the Nazi party and throughout his life maintained a spiritual and moral character. I believe that Makos' book has two climaxes. The first is the encounter of the two pilots in 1943 and the second is what occurred in the 1990's.

After years of correspondence Charlie and Franz

finally met at an amazing reunion. Franz moved to Vancouver, B.C. Canada after the war and Charlie resided in Miami, Florida. In their golden years, the two friends told their story to many civic clubs, air museums and military groups across North America. Both old pilots died months apart in 2008. "Their message was simple: enemies are better off as friends." In retrospect we can take a lesson from Franz's wartime action and shape it into messages that are so necessary in today's world, forgiveness, understanding and ultimate compassion for humanity.

How to Install Zoom software and Join a Zoom meeting:

INSTALL


To use Zoom, you'll first need to install the Zoom "Client" software on your computer.

Go to your web browser (e.g., Safari, Internet Explorer, Google Chrome, etc.) and enter: <https://zoom.us/signup>.

Enter the information requested (birthdate, email address, & click on Sign Up.)

Zoom will send you an email to that address. Open the email & click the Activate button.

Enter your name and make up a personal password.

That's it! You're done ... explore the website if desired and when done, SIGN OUT by clicking on image in the upper right corner. 



HINT: If you want to make it even easier to use Zoom, download and use the Zoom App on your computer, laptop, or tablet.

JOIN A ZOOM MEETING

If you have been sent an invitation, simply click on the link in the email (or copy and paste it into your browser). Allow the page to open "zoom.us" Enter the Meeting Password (not your personal password) if needed.

Alternatively, if you just know the Meeting ID number, enter <https://zoom.us/join> in your browser.

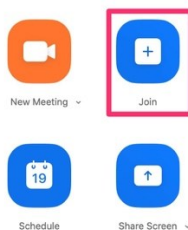
Enter your email address, your password and click Sign In to go to the Zoom website.

In the upper Right Corner, click on JOIN A MEETING.

On the next page, enter the Meeting ID number.

Enter a Password (if needed)

If you have the Zoom App, click on the app icon , go to the top of the page and click on the Home icon, and then click the blue Join icon.



That should do it! Have fun... see you soon!
