

SIR Branch 17, Member Profile: George Traverso, Badge #3

Christmas...a time for family gatherings, cooking delicious dishes and sharing memories of holidays past. This is a perfect time to interview George Traverso, a SIR member who seems to embody the spirit of Christmas. Why? Because by the time we had finished talking, the conversations seemed to all revolve around friends, family, food and fond memories.

For those who know Santa Rosa, the Traverso

name is synonymous with their grocery store and deli started in 1932. George spent his childhood days in an apartment above the original store in downtown Santa Rosa. All early memories go back to that store: the images of high ceilings, stocked shelves, the aroma of Italian meats and cheeses. customers roaming around and the creaky sounds of



the wooden floors. Imagine what it was like to be a kid with a backyard that's a parking lot. George says his parents biggest fear was him getting run over there.

George not only worked in the grocery store, he also went into the fields and picked prunes. He got a whopping 25 cents per box and with the money saved, headed down to Kress' Five and Dime store on 4th Street (the building now houses Mary's Pizza Shack and still bears the Kress name way up on top). What did he buy? Of course, what other young boys craved in the mid 1950s: an authentic Davy Crockett coonskin cap as seen on TV worn by Fess Parker!

George tells of how much he enjoyed attending Montgomery High School. He tried out for football, but after a violent collision with another player left him seeing stars, he decided that sport was not for him. He turned to track, where he did shot put, threw discus and ran high hurdles. He liked almost all his classes, including the sciences, industrial arts, and social studies. He especially liked English class with Mr. Haylock who helped him think creatively and become an excellent writer by describing mental images in words. To this day, George's skillful writing is on display in his Big Sir articles in the **BARK** newsletter.

George says he has always been a nerd, a serious guy. He went on dates but never had a steady girlfriend. He liked the structure of high school where (continued at top to right)

you have a set schedule and move to specific classrooms at specific times. (He worries that COVID-19 homebound kids lack this structured approach to school life.) I asked him to tell me about the worst trouble he ever got into as a kid. Unable to think of anything (compare this with Fred Rose who said he was always getting into trouble!), George said he went outside one New Year's Eve and lit flares, which was illegal, with the help of a friend of the family...the Santa Rosa Chief of Police, Dutch Flohr! Ha! Sorry George, I'm not sure that can be considered "trouble" if you did it with a policeman.

After high school, George attending Santa Rosa Junior College and the University of San Francisco, majoring in industrial relations and economics. He taught high school math and typing at Parkway Junior High School in South San Francisco for a few years before returning to Santa Rosa with his wife, Sandra, to help his dad run the Traverso store. George's passion for education never left him, and after retiring from full time work in 2011 he continues to take courses at Sonoma State University. He is a regular member of our Global Forum group run by Marvin Mai.

George is optimistic about the future. He, like all of us, looks forward to getting away from Zoom and having in-person SIR17 luncheons and activities again. George co-hosts the Wednesday morning Zoom coffee club with Rich de Lambert, sharing food and fond memories with his friends.
