Al warned me that an interview with him would be very boring. I'm delighted to report he was terribly

wrong. Quite to the contrary, I found him to be an exceptionally interesting man. I mean, really...how can someone who fed sewage to a septic tank (isn't that what septic tanks are for?), designed and built bridges and then helped make Santa Rosa the wonderful city it is today, be considered boring?

As a boy, Al fondly remembers hanging out in the bleacher seats at Crosley Field, cheering for his hometown Cincinnati Reds. (He is the same age as Pete Rose who attended another Cincinnati high school). Al says he was a real nerd back then, and lucky to have attended a high school with good math and science classes, along with a very insightful counselor who steered him towards engineering at the University of Cincinnati. His parents also expected him to attend college and be as bright as his sister who graduated valedictorian from high school. Although Al felt pressure to succeed, he loved and even received college credit for those advanced science classes in high school.

At the University of Cincinnati, Al began by studying chemical engineering, thinking that science should be put to practical uses. Quantitative and qualitative chemistry were interesting, yet too esoteric for someone who likes to build things. One day, Al looked out the window and saw some guys with poles and telescopes in a nearby field. He asked, "Who are they...what are they doing?" They were students learning how to survey property to construct a new building and put in a road. "Wow, now that's what I want to do!" Al quickly switched his major to civil engineering and never regretted the change, even though it required an additional year of college to graduate.

The University of Cincinnati taught civil engineering through a cooperative program in which academic studies were supplemented with jobs at local companies, jobs that provided hands-on practical experiences as well as some sorely needed money for college expenses. Al landed a terrific position at the Robert A. Taft Sanitary Engineering Center in Cincinnati, dedicated to improving the "process" of septic tanks. Al was given the prestigious and admittedly stinky job of feeding sewage to septic tanks to study the breakdown *(continued at top to right)*

of fecal materials under various conditions. This experience together with an engineering degree made Al highly employable and California came calling.

Following graduation, Al accepted a position at Caltrans making sure bridges and roads got built safely. Then, one day while reading the newspaper, he saw that Manteca, California was looking for a City Engineer. He landed that job, enjoyed it and followed it with a string of engineering jobs for five different cities. For ten years, he was an Assistant Director of the Santa Rosa Public Works Department in charge of overseeing development of subdivisions, representing City Engineers and verifying that proposals satisfy the latest City General Plan. These Plans address issues related to the physical development and growth of Santa Rosa and represent what the City will look like in the future. Al's knowledge of civil engineering served him well.

Al continues to use his engineering background to evaluate properties as a real estate broker and consult with property developers. Al has many other interesting tidbits too. Al has been married to Jackie for 51 years, and a resident of Santa Rosa for 45 yrs. His hobbies include playing golf and watching his three grandkids play soccer and gymnastics. Al is our Assistant Treasurer and can be found at club luncheons at the table collecting lunch fees. He refers to himself as a "nondescript, local neighbor." # GOLF:

# THE NEW NORMAL

When SIR Golf finally re-opens, we must all adhere to current and future Health and Safety Orders issue by County Health Officers. We must observe protocols set in place by the Golf Courses, including but not limited to the following:

#### In the Pro Shop:

--Players will be required to wear facial coverings while in the Pro Shop.

--There shall be no more than two players in the facility at a time, while keeping a minimum of six feet distance from one another at all times.

--The Pro Shop will not be open for retail sales.

--Only credit card or online payments will be accepted.

--Players shall avoid contact with "frequently touched surfaces" such as: doorknobs, handrails, and counter tops. Players should make use of the provided hand sanitizer when exiting the Pro Shop.

#### On the Golf Course:

--Players shall maintain a minimum six-foot distance from others and shall wear facial coverings when the six foot social distancing requirement cannot be maintained.

--There will be a maximum of four players per group.

--Carts will be limited to one rider and two bags.

--Flags will always be no touch and left in.

--Cups will be filled to within one inch of the green height to avoid reaching in the cup for the ball.

--There will be no shared equipment, including: clubs, tees, ball markers, or golf balls. When identifying balls on the fairway, do so by moving the golf ball with your foot, not your hand.

--Do not pick-up or handle stray golf balls.


--Hand towels, seed/sand bottles, bunker rakes, ball washers, community tees, scorecards and pencils and all on-course water stations will be removed or disabled. Bring your own score card and water bottle, and repair divots & bunkers as best as possible.

--Tournament style golf events shall not be held within any county unless so authorized by the County Health Officer for that jurisdiction.

--No carpooling to SIR-sponsored events unless all riders of the carpool have sheltered in-place together.

-There will be no club-organized social gatherings before or after golf.
