I realize that you, gentlemen, know that I am a history buff. My majors at the University of San Francisco were the studies of Economics and Marketing. These

two programs perfectly fitted me to enter a career in the grocery business in which I participated for almost forty-five years. Now, as a retired person with those subjects in my past life, I am returning to discuss my love of history. I am applying this topic to its importance to this special month...March.

As we approach the month of March, I discovered some very interesting insights about this spring month. Because of its association with the first day of Spring, March, in the Roman calendar, was considered the first month of the year. Rebirth and fresh beginnings to the new season are the themes for this month. The dormant winter season preceding March makes a significant effect on the historical aspect of the month. Before 150 BC March was considered to be the first month of the year. Old Roman calendars presented one year in ten months beginning in March and ending in December. For example, we can still notice the "root" Latin words for the "seven" in September, (continued on page 2)

"eight" in October, "nine" in November and "ten" in December. 

A New Monthly Feature, Member Profiles:

Thanks to people like Steve Carey we rarely think about whether the food at Branch 17 luncheons, BNO, CNO, wine tastings, and coffee club breakfasts is safe to eat. Before joining our club in July 2018, Steve worked for the Sonoma County Environmental



Environmental Health Specialist (aka, Health Inspector), making sure we were buying food prepared and served under sanitary conditions. The Food Safety Program focuses on retail food sale in restaurants, delis, bars, food trucks, special events such as the Apple Blossom Festival, and fairs. All require permits. All are inspected regularly, and all have to comply with state laws concerning the safe service of food. These laws include food storage temperatures, pest control, food handling and preparation, surface sanitation, cooking temperatures, approved food sources, and garbage handling.

According to Steve, "I remember inspecting (Big Sir George) Traverso's Deli many years ago, and it being an example of someone doing everything right." Unfortunately, not all places are as clean as Traverso's. Steve says he has seen his share of rodent and cockroach infestations, poor sanitation, and other situations that required immediate closure. Steve tells a story about three rats that came into a restaurant and up to a table where people were eating, got up on their hind legs, and begged (very adorably) for some food. Steve also tells of ripping a permit off the wall of a restaurant and seeing cockroaches scatter. When problems are found, Health Inspectors educate the restaurants on how to remedy the offenses, and only rarely close the establishment.

Inspectors are charged with making sure food safety laws are followed. Yet, some complain that we are overregulating our food industry in the USA. For instance, in Europe, meats, cheeses and fish hang from the ceiling of restaurants and delis, allowing them to dry while releasing wonderful aromas that attract customers as well as flies and microbes. Look at where such rules are lacking or disregarded. Open air markets in China and the Middle East bring infected animals into contact with the public, resulting in the spread of deadly viruses, such as SARS, MERS and the recent coronavirus. Improper refrigeration is a classic cause of summertime "food poisoning." And who could forget Mary Mallon, (aka, typhoid Mary), a domestic cook, who just didn't see a need to wash her hands before making dinner.

Steve has lots more information to share about the programs run by the Sonoma County Environmental (https://sonomacountv.ca.gov/ Health Department Health/Environmental-Health-and-Safety/) and urges us to submit concerns (continued at top right)

Camera Club:

At the February 21st meeting our speaker, Lindsay Olsen, treated us to pictures from a recent safari conducted by EF Go Ahead Tours. The closeups of these wild animals were fascinating and the photography was superb. Lindsay's

career was in the photography business in Humboldt County. He explained the types of lens he uses, enlightened us on the economics of the photography business where the store owner makes very little money on camera sales and survives on the profits from print and support services and classes. Now that he lives in Santa Rosa, we are fortunate that he will share his skills with us, which I hope will enrichen our photographic efforts. He showed us an example of one of his scrapbooks and he encouraged us to keep scrapbooks from our travels. He does not use post-processing software saying that his pictures are as they come from the camera although his wife uses Photoshop. He prefers wide-angle lenses while his wife leans toward telephoto. He uses the picture sharing web site https://www.slickpic.com/, which gives him cloud storage and password protection on his pictures as opposed to Facebook where pictures are uncontrolled. He described the perspective control lens as expensive and manual and the alternative of a free app https://photomyne.com/. His photo collection was spared devastation from the Tubbs fire but that motivated him to use the scan app on his iPhone to digitize his entire collection (one picture at a time) to keep it safe on the cloud.

Lindsay is working with Gary Cottle of Luther Burbank Elementary using his wildlife pictures where students are working on a project to help endangered wildlife by writing letters from the perspective of the endangered animal.


