July 15th marks the return of Branch 17 in-person luncheons for those who have been vaccinated or have a recent negative test for COVID-19, and who have signed the SIR Event Waiver. We are meeting at Epicenter Sports and Entertainment, 3225 Coffey Lane. You might wonder how we chose this location. Sir Glenn Seime has been researching potential venues ever since it became known that Legends would not be reopening. Among the criteria the BEC had were a preference for a location in Santa Rosa to minimize drive time; ample parking and disabled person parking; a price comparable to what we paid at Legends; food quality and variety like what we enjoyed at Legends; and storage space for Branch equipment. In late March or early April Sir Rich de Lambert alerted Glenn to the possibility of Epicenter. Glenn checked it out and it is the only location he has found that met all our criteria. The BEC authorized a six-month contract with Epicenter beginning with the July luncheon.

that would conclude the end of war hostilities or maintain peace in the following years. The "Man from Missouri" would wage a political battle on the domestic front and attempt to aid countries destroyed by war with an international focus. The primary theme of the Truman book is the establishment of the Truman Doctrine. This policy was centered in aiding the war-torn countries of Greece and Turkey with the intention of containing Soviet aggression shortly after the end of World War II. The sub titles of Scarborough's book reflect the main topics of his work: "Truman, The Cold War and The Fight for Western Civilization."

The second book is *How Ike Led* written by President Dwight Eisenhower's granddaughter, Susan Eisenhower. It follows the life of Eisenhower from the D-Day invasion to Little Rock to the U-2 controversy that cancelled the meeting with Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev near the conclusion of his presidency. Ike had the reputation of studying a situation or crisis and proceeding and taking responsibility for such action. This remarkable trait is evident in his role of Supreme Commander at D-Day and as President so many years later.

The third book is an account of President Barack Obama. *A Promised Land* by Barack Obama is a compelling story of the first African-American to attain the highest office. Obama describes his thoughts in a variety of progressions such as: battles with the global financial dilemma, while he becomes a community organizer, an Illinois senator and then President of the United States.

Whether any particular subject is of interest to the individual, reading opens up an interesting and entertaining avenue to relax and enjoy a topic. Reading a story, especially a narrative or a descriptive one, leads the reader to imagine and interpret in one's mind the progression of the story.

Well, it looks like another warm day...looking forward to reading another Presidential story in my shady garden.

the northeast door of Epicenter: the "VIP Lanes and 300 Room." It is separated from the bowling alley by a wall and four bowling lanes that are not open to the public. Across the entryway is the public restaurant and bar. Epicenter does not open to the public until 1 PM but the bar will be open for our social hour beginning at 11 AM. Our food will be a buffet line served by Epicenter staff.

As of May 1, to attend any outdoor SIR event, you must provide a signed SIR Event Waiver and Release of Liability for Exposure to COVID-19 ("Waiver"). In order to attend any indoor event, you must provide BOTH a signed Waiver AND proof of vaccination for COVID-19 or a negative test result for COVID-19 within three days of the event. This is a mandate from State SIR and is necessary for our Branch, officers and BEC directors to be covered by insurance.

I am the one collecting the documents and keeping track of everything for the time being. If you have a printer/scanner you can email a copy (e.g., pdf or jpg) to me. If you have a smartphone, you can take a photo of them and email them to me. Or you can mail paper copies to me (4740 Pressley Road, SR 95404)—whatever is most convenient for you. Just to clarify, however, I do not have to have paper copies; electronic copies are fine. I only need a copy of the front side of your vaccination card, not the back. If you would like to send me copies of your significant other's documents in anticipation of the return of Couples' Night Out and other co-ed activities, feel free to do that now.

Please provide me your documents as soon as possible. We will have a few blank Waiver forms at the July luncheon but if you wait until then, it might create a significant bottleneck. Remember, we already must collect your lunch money, take attendance and give you your badge, sign in guests, and sell raffle tickets. We are unlikely to have the time or space to collect much COVID paperwork.

Finally, providing me your COVID documents does not imply you are coming to the July luncheon. So that we can get an accurate headcount for the food service, you must notify a person designated by the BEC if you are not coming to the luncheon, otherwise you will be charged the \$25 luncheon price if you do not attend. Details will be in the July BARK.



Our guest speaker is our own Sir Rich Osborne. He is the VP of the North Bay of CA Chapter of the Hearing Loss Association of America. His hearing loss was detected in high school, but nothing was done. As an adult, Rich tried hearing aids, with unsatisfactory results. A few years ago, Rich suddenly lost all hearing in his right ear. His left ear hearing is severely limited, and he is in the process of being evaluated for a Cochlear Implant. In retirement, he sees that hearing loss was a severe handicap to his career as a project manager in IT. He is retired and happily devoting himself to the opportunity to help others cope with the difficulties he encountered.

July 15: Allan Bernstein, MD is a semiretired neurologist, UCSF professor, SCMA member and clinical researcher. The focus of his research is memory, how it works and what can go wrong. He's also conducting clinical trials in Santa Rosa on potential new treatments for Alzheimer's disease.

T.B.D.: Jeffrey Ebersole, PhD is the Interim Chair of Biomedical Sciences & Associate Dean for Research, Department of Dental Medicine, at UNLV. He will tell us about an experiment he is sending to the International Space Station in June. The project will look at how bacteria grow on a solid surface under weightlessness conditions.

Marvin Schouweiler, Badge #44

When talking with Marvin Schouweiler, the world seems to slow down and relax. He has a very gentle voice, a kind personality, and a smile that lights up a room. Marv has been a delightful addition to SIR Branch 17 for over 12 years.

Marv was born into a farming family in Morris MN, a small town about 50 miles southeast of the North Dakota-South Dakota border. When Marv was three, his dad sold the land and moved the family to Sweet Home, Oregon, a town on the eastern side of Interstate 5 between Eugene and Portland. Sweet Home was built on a vast, prehistoric petrified forest, and is still well known for its treasures of agate, jasper, crystals, and minerals. He enjoyed the nearby lakes, rivers and Cascade Mountains for 12 years and then moved with his family to Sonoma County where he has lived ever since.



You can't tell Marvin's story without talking about wood. He developed a love of working with wood perhaps in part due to his dad getting involved in the lumber business in Cloverdale. Marvin's favorite class at Healdsburg High was... you guessed it...wood shop! Later he worked in a lumber mill and on construction sites making the frames to pour massive amounts of concrete for commercial and residential buildings. He discovered that his experience and knowledge about wood and framing was sought after, paid well and provided good benefits.

Over the years Marv has built some amazing structures. Turns out, Sonoma County's wine industry needs lots of concrete for production sites and all those beautiful tasting rooms. A lot of Marv's work can't be seen because it is the concrete foundation hidden under a building or patio. One of his more unusual projects was building cages for an African sun bear and a chimp for a place suitably nicknamed "Old MacDonald's Farm." Not to be undone by that, Hugh Coddling (of Coddington and Montgomery Mall fame) tapped Marv and his team to lay the foundation and build (in less than a week!) a completely finished house for a baby elephant, a political symbol of the Republican party when he considered running for state senate.

He recalls how different it was to live here when Santa Rosa population was only about 25,000. Marv started playing golf when he was 52 and has been playing the game ever since. Marv is famous for his short game skills, enabling him to win putting contests by landing just outside the edge of the green, chipping close to the pin and then one-putting into the hole. Marv also enjoys Boys' Night Out, Couples' Night Out, bocce ball, wine and spirit club along with our monthly luncheons.

Many of us remember Marv heading up our attendance committee and handing out members' badges at luncheons. He was previously an assistant to Lou Funk, who was our attendance chair for over 30 years. Marv looks forward to getting together in person again and sitting at random tables in order to meet more of our members. May 20, 2021 Speaker Recap

Jim Sweeney, Editorial Director of the Press Democrat, began his presentation with an overview of the newspaper business and the PD in particular. Although total readership is down somewhat from its peak circulation, the number of digital subscribers is growing as the number of print subscribers has declined. The number of subscribers as a proportion of the target coverage area is the same as it is for the SF Chronicle. Advertising revenue has been down due to the pandemic, but he is optimistic it will rebound. The paper is now locally owned and is profitable.

Jim talked about how important letters to the editor are. To encourage them, the 90-day rule has been eliminated. He cautioned that if you are quoting someone, find the original source—don't believe everything you read on Facebook!

Jim's goals for the editorial board are to increase its diversity, both geographically, ethnically, by age and by gender; and to increase its coverage of elections and candidates for all the nine major cities of Sonoma County every even year.
