when we have met people or experienced certain events that made a major learning experience in our life's journey. Current problems and challenges force us to rethink and evaluate our opinions on various social positions. These "problems and challenges" present a vast array of issues that touch upon economic and political questions that have recently arisen in our country. I understand here at SIR we do not discuss politics or religion. I can compare some of the events during the "turbulent sixties" to today's threats on our society.

Even though today's issues are somewhat different than the social topic of those 50 years ago, I believe that there is a relationship spanning those years. What I mean in my statement is this: in my view it appears that there is a close similarity in the socio-political climate of the sixties to present day events. The social unrest and the civil rights journey of our minority citizens long ago changed into the Black Lives Matter movement today. The protests arising from the Vietnam War are comparable to the legitimacy of our presence in the Middle East. So, there is always a political theme in comparing the two periods. With that said, let me return to my friend, Ralph.

My friend's five-word sentence is an example of cooling down a situation and offering a pause in serious dialogue. I believe that Ralph's technique is like "stop and smell the roses." Maybe what he was saying in so many words, let us appreciate and honor the fact that we can **agree to disagree**. Life is too short for it to be so serious and sometimes so violent. Let us take a break, cool down and find solutions. Does this sound like an attempt to solve today's social dilemma?

We, at Branch 17, are privileged to have **two** distinguished SIR members in our group.



Born in Manchester, England he lived in France and joined a French Order of Missionary priests, spending ten years in West Africa, several of them during a civil war when he was stood up to be shot. On his return to the UK, he spent a year living as a hermit in Northern Ireland, and then taught in Madrid, Spain and Puerto Rico. Now the owner and President of MJB Consultants, he flies all over the world monitoring and evaluating humanitarian projects and has worked in more than 30 countries. He is completely fluent in several languages, an avid golfer and academically considers himself to be over-engineered, having three master's degrees and a PhD.



He has always been a writer and his first published work "The Bishop Wears No Drawers" (2017) is a memoir of his time spent in Africa, during a civil war. His most recent work, "Let the Peacock Sing" (2020) is an historical novel set against the backdrop of the French Resistance during World War II.

Michael lives with his French wife and a Tibetan terrier in Clayton, CA.


Gordon Boulton, Badge #115

Gordon Boulton is a sensible, no-nonsense guy except when he jumps out of airplanes, asks flight attendants for a date, or takes on death-defying downhill skiing. In fact, three words stick out when you drill down: chemistry, rocketry and bombs. He's like an onion. You peel off one story of his life and you enter a new undiscovered area.

Gordon was born in Long Beach CA where his dad was a chemical engineer for Shell Oil during WWII. As life and employment would have it, his family moved around a lot when he was a kid and included time in England. He recalls going to grade school there and learning that misbehavior meant a sharp rap on the knuckles with a ruler. The family returned to Greenwich CT (with a much more disciplined kid) where he went to high school and, admittedly, became a card-carrying geek. During this time, he took advanced placement chemistry, was inspired by the excitement of Sputnik, and gained a deep interest in explosives, rocketry and pyrotechnics (e.g., fireworks.) He avoided team sports after getting smacked in the nose with a baseball but later enjoyed the thrills of downhill skiing, boating, scuba diving, motorcycles and parachuting.

His interests in chemistry and science, along with some gentle nudging by his dad, led him to pursue a five-year BS degree in mechanical engineering from Trinity College, a small liberal arts, all-male school in Hartford CT. At Trinity, he joined the Air Force (AF) ROTC and eventually went into the AF despite having inadequate eyesight to become a pilot. Gordon had his eyes on a much different prize: a fully paid Master of Business Administration (MBA) degree. The AF assigned him to Los Angeles to work as an engineer in the Space Division in the Space and Missile Systems Organization, which was perfect for the geek who loves chemistry, rocketry and things that go BOOM. There he worked on highly classified early warning satellites that could detect missiles coming at us and identify them based on the optical signature of their exhaust fumes. (There's much more to tell you about these projects but I don't have clearance...you'll have to sit down in a quiet corner and talk to Gordon.)

Gordon spent a lot of time on airplanes while working on AF projects. On one trip returning to Los Angeles from a meeting in Boston, he met Tammy, a stunning flight attendant, who accused Gordon of stealing a miniature bottle of vodka from her cart. (He got it earlier from a friend in first class.) This led to a conversation in the galley, an invitation out on a date and eventually a marriage proposal. In the years that followed, Gordon and Tammy did a lot of international traveling while she was a flight attendant for American Airlines.

Gordon finally got his MBA from Columbia University in New York City with a major in Operations Management. With degree in hand and experience from his AF assignments, he landed a position at Optical Coating Laboratory Inc. (OCLI) in Santa Rosa in 1972. (Side note: Mary Darcy, Tammy's ex-roommate, married SIR17 member Bill Traverso and they moved to Santa Rosa too!) At OCLI, Gordon got involved in a lot of really interesting projects, including optical coatings for windows of the Space Shuttle, as well as mirrors and glass for government and civilian equipment. (Again, you'll need higher clearance to hear more about this work.)

Gordon has been a member of SIR17 since 2016 and now serves ("I was drafted!") as our 2021 Little Sir. In this position, he leads the effort to get outstanding speakers for our monthly luncheons and is looking to pull in interesting people from anywhere in the world. He adds sage advice to our BEC and editorial guidance for the monthly *BARK* newsletter. We encourage you to learn more about Gordon, for example, by asking about his 33 years as a Little League umpire! BOOM!
