As we come to the closing months of the summer, I wish to recall some lasting memories that as I was growing up come to mind and I would like to share with you.

When I was about nine years old at St. Rose School, September was a frightening month filled with lots of nervous anxiety. Anticipating the start of a new school year, I realized that a new weekly routine would soon be upon me and the fond summer memories that I enjoyed would soon fade away.

Back in the “old days” of the 1950's schools usually re-opened shortly after Labor Day, at the first week of September. I recall that we started school on the Tuesday following Labor Day. After a few days passed, all the California schools celebrated Admission Day and we enjoyed a quick respite from the projected nine months of studying. California Admission Day is September 9, 1850. During the past years a California city was selected to host a parade in honor of our State joining the Union. Santa Rosa received that honor one year in the late 1950's. As a result, my classmates and I enjoyed watching that spectacle

as a “day off” from school. Today, my grandchildren begin their school year in the middle of August. So, looking back, my “lazy summer vacation” would have been cut short.

Other recollections of the Septembers of my youth revolve around picking of prunes. Today, I don’t think that there is a living prune (or plum) tree in Sonoma County. Sunsweet in Healdsburg was a major packer of the crop and now most of the processing and growing is centered in the Central Valley, north of Sacramento. At one time, Sonoma County was a leading dairy producer and many crops were on our “county’s table.” Prunes, walnuts, hops, apples, olives and pears made up the majority of the county’s bounty. Today we are blessed with the abundant grape harvests that make our county a major world-class wine producer. We sometimes humorously refer to our neighbor to the East as a car part maker.

But with all kidding aside, prune picking was a hot, dusty and demanding job. I enjoyed working at the many prune ranches of my grandfather’s friends for several years. In September 1961, I began my tenth grade as a sophomore at Montgomery High. Believe it or not, but our first day of school was postponed because of prune harvesting when many young people were needed and most looked forward to make some extra summer money.

Those were the days: Santa Rosa was smaller, most of the kids picked prunes and for me, a new school year was a little foreboding!

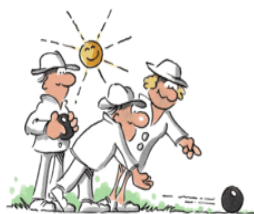
