Installation of new Officers and Directors for 2023.

Luncheon and BEC Meeting Locale Moves To Bennett Valley Grille

In late October the Branch Executive Committee (BEC) voted unanimously to move from Epicenter Sports & Entertainment to the Bennett Valley Grille (formerly Legends) beginning in January 2023.

The primary reason was space. With the membership growth we have experienced, which we have good reasons to expect will continue, we are nearly at the capacity of the luncheon room at Epicenter. (There is a larger room at Epicenter, but it does not have AV facilities.) This was very apparent at the November luncheon. In contrast, at the BV Grille we will once again be able to invite our partners to events, such as the winter holiday luncheon. Some members have been complaining that they feel crowded at Epicenter for many months, and in the recently completed member survey "New Location" was by far the largest response to the questions "How can we improve our monthly meetings?" and "What would make your membership more valuable to you?"

Another reason was aesthetics. The BV Grille, with its veranda (included in our contract) overlooking the golf course, is clearly superior to the view of the Epicenter parking lot.

A third reason is that the BV Grille is closer to the neighborhoods in which most of our members live. Although we will be paying \$33 each for the luncheon at the BV Grille vs. the \$26 Epicenter quoted us for 2023, the higher price is partially offset by the lower travel cost and time to and from the BV Grille compared to Epicenter.

The decision to move was somewhat bitter-sweet in light of how well the Epicenter staff has treated us since we resumed in-person lunches. We owe a lot of thanks to our food coordinator Sir Glenn Seime and treasurer Sir Al Petrie for establishing such an excellent relationship with them.

Two very important changes as part of our move: (1) we need to have a luncheon attendance count the **Wednesday** of the week prior to our luncheon, rather than

the **Monday** of the week of our luncheon, so our Phone Committee will be calling you much earlier than you are used to; and

(2) we expect the BV Grille will charge us for no-shows, in contrast with Epicenter which was very flexible in this regard. So the 2023 BEC may reimplement the prior policy of charging members who say they plan to attend but then do not!

I have two children, Christine and Tim. Chris lives in Cambodia while Tim is in San Francisco with our two grandchildren.



My major hobbies are: travel and more travel, fishing any description such as fly fishing...the best.





Jim Fenstermaker, Badge #57

When asked to describe Jim Fenstermaker, Little Sir Gary Bondi, says "There are so many things about Jim and his involvement with SIR 17, that I don't know where to begin." Others say the same thing...Fenstermaker is amazing! He has done so much for the club and has rightfully earned the reputation of the guy who always accepts the challenge and does what needs to be done. Gordon Boulton, Big Sir, acknowledges "Jim is our corporate memory. As others come and go, Jim is the constant who knows how things are supposed to work, who is supposed to do what, when and how." "When I want to know something about SIR17, I Google *Fenstermaker!*" admits Fred Rose.

Jim learned to be resourceful and responsible as a young boy working on his parents' farm in Woodson IL, about 80 miles north of St. Louis and 30 miles west of Springfield. His dad always wanted to do farming and finally bought 80 acres during the depression to raise cattle, hogs, chickens, and turkeys. Jim, his sister, and brother understood what hard work meant and that their work could be rendered useless by bad luck, bad insects, and bad weather. Farming is sometimes a big gamble. So, in high school, which he also didn't like very much, he took classes in drafting and carpentry that distanced him from farming and introduced him to a career in wood-working and lumber sales.

The winters in central IL can be brutal and Jim got tired of "scraping six inches of partly cloudy off the driveway, morning and night." With a sad farewell to his widowed mother, Jim headed west to CA to find a good job and warmer weather. His search took him to his brother's place in Santa Clara and then to the Livermore/Pleasanton area and

and finally to Santa Rosa.

With experience in millwork sales, Jim landed a series of jobs with building material and pre-hung door manufacturing companies before he retired in 2003. Jim has lots of interests including woodworking, electrical work, gardening, computers, and displaying dozens of adorable gnome lawn ornaments. He and his lovely wife Jean are excellent photographers, and their nature photos are breathtaking. These hobbies kept him very busy until he was coaxed by his neighbor, Bud Hill, to come to a SIR17 luncheon. At that time, we were meeting at the Scottish Rite Temple off Route 12 and just a few blocks from Jim's house. Although he prefers to avoid crowds, Jim liked the food, the comradery, and interesting speakers, and quickly volunteered to address the club's needs. Jim is well known across the entire State SIR organization as the editor of the acclaimed SIR17 *BARK* newsletter. Publishing was something he learned on the fly when he helped his and Jean's Scandinavian club with their newsletter. He had a steep learning experience, especially when the guy who was teaching him unexpectedly died. Knowing Jim had some knowledge of newsletters, John Sommerville asked Jim to publish the *BARK*. The early *BARK* newsletter was simply a single legal-size piece of mimeograph paper printed on one side. Jim taught himself how to use computer software to make the newsletter longer, interesting, and more readable. To date, Jim has only missed publishing one issue since August 2012, that being due to a 11-day hospital stay last year!

Despite his serious health issues that have sidelined his attendance at recent luncheons, Jim continues to perform many tasks for us in addition to publishing the *BARK*. Jim maintains and updates the club rosters, tracks our attendance, stores the huge badge boxes in the back of his truck, assembles new member packets, puts the names on new member badges, coordinates the phone tree list to determine luncheon attendees, and is an assistant webmaster. He even served as our club Secretary but had to relinquish that

position due to a severe hearing issue.

Jim's devotion and dedication to our Branch is admired by all members who know him. 
Vision Statement:

Capital improvements, fuel costs, etc. exceed present income. As a member of the newly created BV Advisory Committee, Jim Gurke had the opportunity to review a draft schedule of revised green fees. For us seniors, the proposed increases appear minimal. As a city owned course, fee changes require approval of the SR City Council. At the December 6th 'study session' Touchstone management will present its case. The meeting is open to the public.

Since October, the SIR Branch 17 Golf Committee reinstated "travel golf," at courses besides the Monday BV rounds. Notices will be distributed via email to the entire golf membership prior to each event. On January 12, 2023 we have scheduled to play Rooster Run in Petaluma. Closer to that date we'll issue a separate notice inviting players to fill the three scheduled tee times. Carelessly making a stroke and missing without a verbal concession is a stoke counted.


