



SIR Branch 17, Member Profiles: Neil Wheeler Badge #24

Imagine a boy, 12 years old, tucked away in his bedroom at night listening to exotic radio stations on the short-wave radio he built and hooked to an antenna way up in the attic. Neil was fascinated with science and electronics. He loved his home chemistry set experiments and truly enjoyed physics in high school. From this, you could get an image of Neil as a nerdy guy, yet there's so much more to him than just tech interests.

Growing up in Napa, his home life included taking care of horses, cows, chickens, and goats on the family "mini ranch." He joined the California Cadet Corps in high school where he learned to

develop leadership, acaexcellence, demic basic military and practical knowledge. CACC's cadets have become astronauts. chemists, doctors, and other professions. Founded in 1911, the Cadet Corps motto is "Essayons," a French word meaning "Let us try." That is the essence of Neil's personality...let us try!



Neil's professional career centered around meteorology; a scientific discipline considered to be the "physics of the atmosphere." Neil has a passion for teaching physics, and he has taught at SRJC as well as other colleges and universities. He studied and computer-modeled air quality for California and organizations and governments worldwide. While in Sacramento, Neil met Barbara on a blind date. Barbara was a lobbyist for the trucking industry at the same time Neil was helping to set up the stricter clean air regulations for the state. Despite their employers being on opposite ends of the environmental spectrum, Neil and Barbara found a way to get truckers to actually support clean air regs. This success in legislative activities eventually led to wedding bells for Neil and Barbara.

Neil has an adventuresome side that shows up occasionally in his life story. He studied the history of the fur trade (Continued at top right)

Neil has become the "go to" guy in our club since joining SIR 17 in 2021. During the Zooming days of the pandemic, Neil installed cameras and microphones so we could attend our virtual luncheons and BEC meetings. He has also set up the closed captioning at our meetings to envision textual dictation of our spoken words. The numerous 'atmospheric rivers' California experienced have taken a toll on infrastructure, including our local Bennett Valley golf course. Matanzas Creek became a small river bringing a lot of debris downstream. Intake valves used to

bring irrigation water onto the course are presently buried under several feet of silt. Our course has gone from muddy to hardpan in a few short weeks.

To counteract concerns about course conditions, Council members, Chris Rogers and Mark Stapp, visited the course to inspect the irrigation system. They posted the following notice on the Save Bennett Valley Facebook page.

We heard concerns from a few folks today that the City was allowing the Bennett Valley Golf course to deteriorate so that we could close it and develop it. Here's what's actually happening:

"When we sought a new operator and did a full assessment of deferred maintenance, the irrigation system was the most important (and expensive) fix. The City has been working with Touchstone— the new operator— to develop the long-term solution. Candidly, that will take some time to implement. In the meantime, the recent wave of storms did some additional damage to the irrigation system. The City is putting in additional resources to fix the current problem and keep the course playable in the short term. The grounds will continue to be watered, the city is still committed to seeing Touchstone be successful, and there's no conspiracy wherein which we are trying to bulldoze the course."

The good thing is that tee shot role-out makes second shots that much closer to the greens, that are hand watered and still in excellent shape.

So come out play your **best** each Monday morning.
