

SIR Branch 17, Member Profiles: **Don Malvestiti** Badge #043

Talking with Don Malvestiti is like listening to a radio show. He has a professional, smooth voice and can tell you a million entertaining stories. What fun to talk with someone with an infectious laugh and a positive attitude about life despite some hard knocks he's endured over the years. The longer you talk with him, the more times he admits he's had a wonderful life and apologizes for telling too many stories. No apologies needed...he is fascinating, friendly and eager to hear your stories too.

Don was born and raised in the Corona Heights section of San Francisco. He attended the former San Francisco Polytechnic High School across the street from Kezar Stadium. Although he didn't play any sports, he participated as a school cheerleader. Don enjoyed drafting classes and being involved in student government. As the President of the SF Youth Association, a collective of student body officers from area schools, he was on KPIX TV at 7:30 am on Sunday mornings, talking about what was going on at all the schools. His TV fame increased further when the station invited him to help organize a teen dance show, sort of like Dick Clark's American Bandstand. However, the station had to let Don go when he did not join the union, effectively killing his blossoming show biz career.

Don claims being an only child was wonderful. Although his parents spoiled him, they also were strict with spending money. With limited funds as a teenager and good with his hands, Don built his own speed boat and skis, and had fun



cruising the Russian River near their cabin in Rio Nido.

After high school, Don attended City College of San Francisco, UC Berkeley, and finally San Francisco State University, receiving a degree in engineering and a teaching certificate. His decision to become a teacher was based in part on a trip he took (continued to right at top)

to Europe where he saw how people appreciated education, and realized teaching would be a good area to get a job. In 1963 he started teaching at Abraham Lincoln High School in San Francisco and, years later, taught in Marin County. Don taught industrial arts, basic math, history, and English. His colleagues were impressed with his ability to connect with the students. The kids liked him too. Don recognized that his students are very knowledgeable and have expertise in lots of things. For example, the students advised Don on how to buy tires, and once helped him get an emergency car repair after a breakdown on 101. A former student working on a dairy farm provided Don with a generous amount of cow manure for his garden, showing that not all the poop students give teachers is unwanted.

Don met Beverly after his friends set them up at a party. Don and Bev had an instant attraction but didn't start dating seriously for several weeks when he invited her, without warning, to have Irish Coffee with him after his class. She agreed (even though she wasn't 21 yet!) and Don says, "the rest is history." They got married, raised three children, moved out of San Francisco, and eventually landed in Santa Rosa. Don and Bev were married for 60 years before she died this past summer. Don says the loss of a spouse is devastating, but, with the support of family and friends, you learn to keep moving forward.

Don is a man who admittedly can't sit still! He considered retiring after his teacher days, but not having a job was just no good. After working as a real estate appraiser, he became a courier for ETS Laboratories, transporting wine samples for chemical and physical analysis. Although this job prevents him from attending our Thursday luncheons, he has always been an active member of SIR17 since being inducted in February 2013. Don was a bartender at our SIR17 meetings when we met on Fridays at the Scottish Rite Center, and a founding member of the (in)famous "Italian Table" at the luncheons. 


