There are some changes coming for our branch! We have been in ongoing discussions with the leadership of Branch 76, re-

garding a merging of our branches. ### SIR Branch 17, Member Profiles: Duane Jensen Badge #094

One of the best rewards of talking to Duane Jensen and other "senior" members is to get a glimpse of the history of SIR17. For example, did you know that our branch once had 275 members and met at the former Los Robles Lodge in the Coddingtown Mall area? You had to be on a waiting list to get in. Duane Jensen hurried to get on that list before he retired as he was eager to play SIRs golf with Bud Hill, George Beck, Jim LaMar, and other great guys in the club who played golf and socialized regularly.

Duane was raised in Cedar Falls, Iowa and played football and basketball in high school. Although a very good athlete, he said "You didn't need to be great there to be on the team...it was a small school...and my sister's husband was the basketball coach!" Duane



went away to college in Nebraska and hoped to play football. That did not work out, so he joined the "semi-pro" team sponsored by a farm equipment manufacturer in that town and got \$5.00 together with a spaghetti dinner and a beer after each game. He was fast and could throw a football, but his "professional" football career stopped after the season ended.

Duane joined the Marine Corps Reserves and was at Summer Camp in Quantico, VA. in 1950 when the Korean War broke out. They were "frozen-in" and sent to Camp Pendleton to form replacement drafts. His ability to use a typewriter and a calculator were valued enough to keep him from being sent overseas. Following his military stint, Duane headed back to the University of Iowa and graduated with a degree in economics. He went to work for a stock and commodity brokerage firm with offices around the Midwest. Being handsome (see his photo as evidence), an athlete, and having a good job, (Continued on top right)

he had no problem meeting girls and met Shirley, a lovely student at the University of Nebraska, at a local coffee shop. This led to a long courtship and marriage that additionally turned out to be useful. Duane had switched careers and took over a State Farm Agency in Fort Dodge, lowa. The agency management at that time, said "to be a respectable agent, the expectation was that you would be married." So, he and Shirley said, "No problem!" and got married.

Duane's career in insurance moved him on to CA and into State Farm auto claims and then into State Farm Fire & Casualty claims. Completing law school by correspondence led to management positions in claims administration and ending with litigation management over a portion of the Bay Area.

Duane still has his 1994 application for membership in SIR17. He received a polite letter telling him to wait for an opening as they were currently full. He would be allowed to attend luncheons with his host, but it would cost him \$9.00. The letter also spelled out the requirements of membership that included mandatory attendance at luncheons, either at SIR17 or other SIR clubs. Duane is the second longest serving member in SIR17 (29 years) with Bob Zeni being our longest (30 years, see his July 2021 BARK profile).

Duane was an avid golfer until his shoulder needed four operations. He now walks daily, watches "way too much" TV and enjoys NFL and college games. Duane and Shirley have traveled and cruised the world extensively and have two children. He continues to enjoy the companionship of the SIR17 club and like many of us, is delighted at the "new blood" coming into the club. He looks forward to talking with all of you and hearing your stories.



I was born and raised in Oakland, graduating from Oakland High School in January, 1950. I went then to U.C. Berkeley and in 1956 graduated from dental school at UCSF.

There followed two years in the Navy, which I was able to join because an admiral intervened after I was told I was a quarter-inch too short to serve as an officer. I became a Navy dentist.

For six months I served at the Marine base at Camp Pendleton, then for 18 months aboard the aircraft carrier Yorktown in the Pacific.

Following discharge, a friend got me a job as a dentist on the Army base in Orleans, France. I spent a year there and took some wonderful travels—even got to Pamplona, Spain, twice to run with the bulls!

From Europe I returned to Oakland, where I practiced for two years before enrolling at the University of Michigan to earn a master's degree in Childrens' Dentistry.



From Ann Arbor, my wife and

two daughters and I traveled to Copenhagen, Denmark, where I taught at a dental school. Denmark was a great place to live for a year. The low point came when I learned while in Scandinavia that President John F. Kennedy had been assassinated.

The following year, 1964, we decided it was time to settle down. We moved to Santa Rosa, where the city limits sign told of a population of 43,000. We had a son, growing our family to five.

I was lucky to join the 20-30 Club and make lifelong friendships. Santa Rosa was a great, friendly place to be in business and to become active in volunteering. I was on the boards of the YMCA, Volunteer Center, the local chapter of Canine Companions for Independence, Community Health Centers and the Redwood Empire Food Bank.

Socially, we have long been members of the Wild Oak Saddle Club.

To live and be active in Santa Rosa was the greatest choice my family could have made.

Hi, my name is Joe Olson. I was born in Southern California in a city called Lynwood and was raised as a child in Lakewood, a city just south of Long Beach. I liked and played a lot of sports as a child such as baseball and basketball in Catholic school at Saint Maria Goretti until the sixth grade. The family moved to Santa Rosa in September of 1967. In Santa Rosa the schools attended were Matanzas Elementary, Herbert Slater, Montgomery High, and Santa Rosa Junior College. A graduate from SRJC in Natural Sciences in 1978, I took a lot of chemistry and math courses. The summer of 1978 was the beginning of my main career in the casino business and I started a summer job in the entertainment world as a 21blackjack dealer at Harrah's Hotel and Casino Resort. The summer was great, so they let me stay on as a full-time dealer to pursue that direction as my starting career.

In Tahoe in my second year, I got married which lasted two years. I decided to go back to school at California State University Sacramento where I got my BS degree in Management Information Systems (MIS). I was still working part time at Harrah's Tahoe on weekends twice a month. After graduation at CSUS I became a supervisor in the gaming department and learned the game of Craps. Craps was the game to learn then, before California Indian gambling began.

In 2013 the decision to move back to Santa Rosa was a grave one because my father needed me but never asked me to help him. I sold my home knowing it was a chance to open the door to go back to college and go into the Radiol-



ogy Tech Program offered at SRJC at age 58. It was a lottery gamble, but my good grades didn't count after two years studying to get into the program. I tried four times, once every year, without the luck of the draw. When my father died it closed that door and opened the
