We ask that you try to arrive at 9:45 so we can check in on the computer and get started promptly at 10 a.m. The computer process can be a little slow and we sometimes require staff assistance. Arriving early helps us get started comfortably.

Friends and family are welcome. This is a great way for new members to meet members of Branch 17. Working together is a true community event. A reminder, the Food Bank is having a peanut butter food drive (spreading the love), so we encourage everyone to bring a jar. Their goal is to receive 15,000 jars.

At our last outing, we had 24 people participating—21 were Sir Branch 17 members and three were spouses. They divided us up into three groups: packing senior boxes, making food containers, and packaging produce. We made 396 senior boxes, 3,000 food bags, and packaged 1,867 lbs. of apples, 727 lbs. of pears, and 624 lbs. of carrots. The total was 3,218 lbs. for 13,106 meals that were to be delivered the next day.

Unfortunately, one group working on the senior boxes did not have a Chair or Vice Chair to speak up for a break on the assembly line. One member mentioned that this was really hard on his back. We regret that this happened, and we'll make sure that this does not happen again. We did get a heartfelt message from Caden Downing of the Food Bank, "Thank you all so much for your time and energy last week in the warehouse. It was wonderful to see your group having such a good time while working to help the Redwood Empire Food Bank end hunger in our community. What a great team you have!"

You will be provided with a name lanyard and a card to be punched for attendance when you come to the Food Bank. Ten punches and you are entered into a monthly prize drawing. The Branch 17 Community Involvement Program Committee has started an additional prize drawing on every visit. Your attendance will automatically enter you for a prize. The winner for January was Sir Rich de Lambert.

The Science of Aging—Your Liver



Your liver is an amazing organ, performing over 500 vital functions needed for good health. It makes cholesterol, vitamin D and blood plasma, and it identifies the nutrients your body needs, then stores some away for future use. It filters 1.53

quarts of blood every minute, removing all kinds of poisons, and produces a quart of bile every day to help you break down fats in your food and aid in blood clotting.

With age, blood flow through it decreases, and the ability to process toxins and drugs decreases, potentially leading to more side effects from medications you're taking. Repair of damaged liver cells is also slower with aging, and the amount of bile decreases, resulting in risk of the bile hardening into gallstones. Alcohol, high fructose sugar, obesity and (hepatitis) viruses can have devastating effects on the liver.



The good news, the liver is well known for its regenerative capabilities. Patients who have had up to two thirds of their liver surgically removed can find the organ almost completely regrows to its previous sizewithin a year. Also, the liver doesn't seem to age as quickly as other organs and can be fully functional at age 90 or older!

Medical researchers have suggested that, after death, nonagenarians are a largely untapped pool of potential liver donors, citing several successful transplants in recent years. Take care of your liver, and when you're done with it...give it to someone who needs it more than you!



Bud Morgan May 2, 1933 - January 28, 2024



Bud Morgan, a member of SIR Branch 17 for 18 years, passed away on January 26, 2024 at 90 years of age. Bud was born in Chicago but moved frequently, as his dad was in the military. He graduated from high school in Waynesboro, Virginia and joined the Air Force right after. He served for 30

years as a medical technician and logged over 10,000 hours of flight time on medivacs in Korea and Vietnam, and as a crew member on the last flight of POWs from Hanoi to Clark Air Base in the Philippines. His last duty station was Travis AFB in Fairfield CA.

His passion was fishing, and he and his wife Linda went fishing for a year until she lovingly told him enough was enough!
